## IMPORTANT NOTICE TO REGISTERED VOTERS

Throughout the past few elections, accessibility concerns have been raised regarding the current voting sites. A majority of changes were implemented in 2015; however, in order to remain compliant with the Federal Help America Vote Act (HAVA) and the Americans with Disabilities Act, as well as with NJSA Title 19, there have been changes made to voting districts 1, 2, and 7 in the Borough of Tenafly.

The new polling sites for Districts 1, 2, and 7 are the following:

### District 2

**McCandless Room off Library**

We had training sessions with Stryker to go over the Lucas 3, where our EMTs got to try it out and make sure they felt comfortable using this device. We are extremely proud to now have the Lucas 3 on our ambulance so we are better prepared for Cardiac Arrest calls, again thanks to Blaker family.



TVAC is thankful for all of the other donations we receive throughout the year. These donations continue to ensure we are able to stay up to date with our training, equipment and education.

The Borough has recently seen an increase in the number of pedestrians struck by a motor vehicle this year. Seven pedestrians have been struck in 2019 to date. Of the seven, four involved pedestrians crossing in marked crosswalks, one involved crossing between cars, one involved walking behind a backing vehicle, and one involved a pedestrian crossing the street mid block (not at an intersection). Four of them involved school-age kids going to or from school. The Tenafly Police Department wants to remind all drivers of their legal requirement to yield right-of-way to pedestrians crossing the road. New Jersey Statutes Annotated Title 39:4-36(a.) requires *a driver to yield right-of-way to pedestrians within an un-marked crosswalk*, and 39:4-36(a)(1) requires *drivers to stop and remain stopped to allow a pedestrian to cross within a marked crosswalk*. Everyone should know that every roadway intersection is designated a crosswalk whether marked or unmarked according to NJSA Title 39:1-1 “Crosswalk”.

While the traffic laws mentioned above place requirements on drivers to stop and yield to pedestrians crossing the street, a number of traffic laws place requirements on pedestrians on how and when to properly cross the street. NJSA 39:4-32(f) states a pedestrian upon a roadway at any point other than within a marked or unmarked crosswalk must yield right-of-way to all vehicles. NJSA 39:4-34 requires pedestrians to cross the roadway in a crosswalk (marked or unmarked) and to walk on a sidewalk where provided. NJSA 39:4-32(d) and 39:4-36(a)(4) both specifically read *“no pedestrian shall leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield or stop”*. The last statutes are of significant importance based on many people’s unrealistic expectation of a driver’s ability to safely slow down and stop a vehicle. Pedestrians should review the following chart that lists safe stopping distances for vehicles traveling at certain speeds. Attempting to cross the street when an approaching vehicle is within a safe stopping distance is dangerous and an example of failing to yield right-of-way to a vehicle.

Posted Speed Limit	Safe Stopping Distances
Posted 25 MPH Speed Limit	161 Feet
Posted 30 MPH Speed Limit	193 Feet
Posted 35 MPH Speed Limit	228 Feet
Posted 40 MPH Speed Limit	262.5 Feet
Posted 45 MPH Speed Limit	305 Feet

\*\* The chart factors in vehicles travelling 10 MPH above the posted speed limit as they commonly do, i.e. the safe stopping distance for a car travelling in a posted 25 MPH zone is actually the stopping distance for a vehicle travelling at 35 MPH.

## **PEDESTRIAN SAFETY CONTINUED...**

While motorists and pedestrians have separate legal requirements that govern how they travel upon the roadways, they must share the roadway by knowing and respecting each other's rules. With that said, drivers have a duty to exercise due care for the safety of any pedestrian in a roadway.

### **Helpful Safety Tips for Drivers**

#### **Be Alert**

- Look for pedestrians at all times.
- Follow posted speed limits especially in school zones.
- Use extra caution in bad weather.
- Be mindful when turning in the road, pulling into and out of driveways, and backing up.

#### **Crosswalks**

- Always yield to pedestrian in a crosswalk.
- When approaching a crosswalk, reduce speed and be prepared to stop.
- When stopped at crosswalk, allow enough room between your vehicle and the crosswalk so others can see the pedestrians you have stopped for.
- Do not pass vehicles at a crosswalk.

### **Helpful Safety Tips for Pedestrians**

#### **Be Visible**

- Make sure you're visible to drivers at all times and make eye contact with them when possible.
- Wear lightly colored clothing and stay in well lit areas when crossing at night.

#### **Stay Alert – Avoid Distractions**

- Put down phone and remove or turn off headphones.
- Remove hoods that reduce peripheral vision.

#### **Follow Rules**

- Know and follow all traffic rules, signs and signals.
- Never assume a driver will give you the right-of-way. Assume they're distracted.

#### **Walk in Safe Places**

- Use crosswalks when crossing the street and wait for safe gaps in traffic.
- Stay on sidewalks whenever possible. If not available, walk facing oncoming traffic.

## Grass – Cut It and Leave It!

### Grass clippings are no longer collected by DPW

Tenafly Department of Public Works utilizes the “Grass Cut It and Leave It” Program for cutting grass in all Borough Parks and Property. This program is also recommended for all residents. Grass clippings are a major part of New Jersey’s municipal solid waste stream. As a New Jersey resident, you are already helping to reduce the amount of waste by recycling newspapers, plastics, cans and glass. But you can easily recycle the clippings you generate each time you mow your lawn – and save time and money while doing it. Disposing of grass clippings is very costly and wasteful. Grass clippings make up thousands of tons of New Jersey’s solid waste. They represent a waste management cost that you pay either directly to your trash hauler or indirectly in taxes. You can help by just leaving your clippings on the lawn when you mow. Grass clippings provide a natural and healthy fertilizer for a growing lawn. You’ll save time because you won’t have to stop to empty your lawnmower bag, and you’ll avoid trips to the garbage can. You can spend less on fertilizer as clippings provide nutrients such as nitrogen putting it back into the soil.

**If you cut your grass and need to dispose of clippings, you may take this material to the Tenafly Recycling & Convenience Center for disposal. Grass should be transported in your own trash container or bio-degradable paper bags. No plastic bags or blue recycling bins should be used.**



## MEASLES INFORMATION

**The following information about measles is provided by the New Jersey Department of Health on behalf of the Tenafly Board of Health. This information is intended for educational purposes only and is not intended to replace consultation with a health care professional.**

Measles is a very contagious and very easily spread respiratory disease caused by a virus. Before the measles vaccine became available, measles was a common childhood disease. Measles is considered the most deadly of all childhood rash/fever illnesses. Anyone who has not already had measles or has not received the measles vaccine can get the disease. There are still cases of measles around the world where populations are not vaccinated against the disease.

Measles is easily spread from person to person. Ninety percent (90%) of people who have close contact with an infected person will get measles if they were not previously vaccinated. The virus is released into the air when an infected person talks, coughs or sneezes. It can enter another person's body through their nose, mouth or throat. People can also become sick if they come in contact with the mucus or saliva (spit) from an infected person. The measles virus can live on infected surfaces and in the air for up to two (2) hours.

Some of the symptoms of measles include: High fever, cough, runny nose, red, watery eyes and a rash. This rash usually appears 3-5 days after the symptoms begin and presents as flat red spots on the face at the hairline spreading downward to the neck, trunk, arms, legs, and feet.

Measles can be serious in all age groups. However, children younger than five (5) years of age and adults older than twenty (20) years of age are more likely to suffer from measles complications. Unfortunately, for every 1,000 children who get measles, one or two will die from it. Other complications from the measles infection include ear infections, pneumonia, swelling of the brain and miscarriage, pre-mature birth, or a low-birth-weight baby can result in a measles infection among pregnant women.

A health care provider will observe symptoms and will perform lab testing to find out if a person is infected with measles. If you suspect an exposure, you are urged to CALL a healthcare provider BEFORE going to a medical office or emergency department. A person infected with measles can spread the disease before showing symptoms; therefore, special arrangements will need to be made when you visit your doctor or emergency department to help protect others from getting sick.

## **WISHFUL RECYCLING**

Tenafly residents love to recycle! But sometimes we get a little too enthusiastic and put inappropriate items into recycling bins, hoping they will be recycled. When this happens, we call it “wishful” recycling. This can do more harm than good. Recycling is a challenge.

Items placed in your recycling bin get mixed with everyone else’s and then sent to a large materials recovery facility plant. At this point, glass, cans, and plastic are separated by type and then shipped to companies that do additional processing. Eventually, the can or plastic bottle that you recycled becomes a raw material for a new product such as a new can or bottle. That new bottle or can is used and the process begins again.

At least that is how it is supposed to work. Recycling is a group project. Unfortunately, not everyone in the group is doing their part. Items that are dirty or that just aren’t recyclable are getting into recycling bins. Dirty recyclables contaminate clean materials. Items that don’t belong can get hopelessly tangled with other items or in machines at the sorting facility. Contaminated items, such as diapers, can create a huge mess and ruin entire loads of recyclables. Instead of your town receiving reimbursement for recycling, it now has to pay for removal of the entire truck load as garbage.

Make sure you are recycling correctly and know what goes into the recycling bins. Wishful recyclers can cause as many problems as careless recyclers. So combine your good intentions with good information. Go to [www.tenaflynj.org](http://www.tenaflynj.org) to learn what is accepted for recycling in Tenafly.

### **DON’T PLACE THESE ITEMS IN YOUR RECYCLING BINS:**

- ♦ **Pizza boxes – place in trash.**
- ♦ **Glass dishes and bakeware – place in trash.**
- ♦ **Plastic bags of any kind – place in trash or recycle these at your supermarket.**
- ♦ **Garden hoses – place in trash.**
- ♦ **Styrofoam – place in trash.**
- ♦ **Packaging material – peanuts, bubble and shrink wrap – place in trash.**
- ♦ **Wire hangers – bring to Recycling Center for scrap metal – do not put in Recycling Bins.**

REGULATIONS & REMINDERS**

1. No idling of vehicles while at center.
2. No trailers or commercially registered vehicles permitted.
3. Plastics #1, #2 or #5 only are accepted for commingled recycling.
4. Styrofoam & plastic bags are not recyclable –place in trash.
5. Please read signage for proper disposal of items. If unsure, ask attendant.
6. Decal is required for use. Authorization form is available at DPW Office, 107 Grove Street. Residents must provide driver’s license and vehicle registration.

**\*\*\*PLASTIC BAGS ARE NOT RECYCLABLE. PLEASE DO NOT PUT YOUR RECYCLABLE ITEMS IN PLASTIC BAGS OF ANY KIND. THEY WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.**

**\*\*\*PLEASE USE BLUE RECYCLING BINS PROVIDED BY THE BOROUGH. DO NOT USE ANY BINS LARGER THAN 20 GALLON CAPACITY. THEY WILL NOT BE PICKED UP.**

## Summer Yard & Garden Clean-up



All garden refuse except grass clippings is considered debris and is collected by the garbage contractor, Waste Industries, on your regular garbage collection days. This includes weeds, hedge trimmings, sticks, plants, seed pods, etc. This material should be placed in garbage bags or garbage cans at the curb on your regular garbage pick-up day.

**Do not use blue recycling containers, as this material is trash and is not recyclable.**

## Watercourses and Drainage Ditches



Residents are responsible for maintenance of streams, watercourses and drainage ditches on their property. Section 12-4 of the Borough Code details the maintenance responsibilities of property owners and residents. It is unlawful for any owner, tenant or occupant of any lot or tract of land across which there exists any drainage ditch, ravine, stream, culvert or other water source, to permit the accumulation of loose brush, fallen leaves, tree branches, dead trees, stumps, garbage, trash and/or other debris to the extent that such accumulation presents a risk of washing downstream thereby causing a blockage of said watercourse, and/or flooding or damaging of adjacent downstream properties.

## Disposal of Branches and Tree Limbs

Sticks, branches and tree limbs from residents' yards are collected by the garbage contractor, Waste Industries. They must be put into a garbage can and placed at the curb for pick up on your regular garbage collection days. Large branches must be cut into lengths 3 feet or less and bundled for pick up.

**DO NOT use blue Borough recycling containers, as this material is not recycled.**

## Environmental Education at the Earth Fair

The Tenafly Environmental Commission and Green Team worked hard, along with respective members of Closter, Cresskill, Demarest, Harrington Park, Haworth, Norwood and Old Tappan to host the 6th Annual Northern Valley Earth Fair at the Tenafly Middle School on April 27. Despite the blustery weather, it was considered a resounding success with over 2,500 people attending. Various Tenafly departments, including police and public works, and the Board of Education were the among the contributors to the fair's success.

Vendors and exhibitors showcased environmental issues and “green” solutions; goats, a rabbit, an owl and chickens were on hand for the children to pet and to understand the animals’ needs for habitat protection; and the plight of the diminishing bee population was front and center with two vendors explaining life inside and out of a bee hive.

Columbia University’s Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory was present, enthralling children with hands-on science experiments and the beautifully costumed Thunderbird American Indian Dancers entertained with traditional dances passed down from their parents ~ just a few of the educational activities and demonstrations highlighting sustainable practices and ways to protect and preserve our environment. These items should be returned to the stores where they were purchased. The law requires these stores to accept them for disposal at no charge. ## Borough Housing Rehabilitation Program Offers \$25,000 at 0% Interest to Fix Up Your Home

Borough housing rehabilitation loans of up to \$25,000. 0% interest. No monthly payments. The loan is repaid **only** when your house is sold. Borough homeowners must meet State income guidelines to be eligible.

"The Tenafly Housing Rehabilitation Program is now able to lend eligible Borough homeowners up to \$25,000, at 0% interest, to help fix up their homes," according to Tenafly Mayor Peter Rustin. " There is no loan repayment until the house is sold. Homeowners who want to get a Borough housing rehabilitation loan must submit a simple, one-page preapplication to have the Program Coordinator contact them to begin the process. If your home is in need of basic repair, and if you meet the program income guidelines, you may be eligible."

The Tenafly Housing Rehabilitation Program (THRP) is sponsored by the Borough of Tenafly as part of the Borough's Affordable Housing Program. The Borough must provide assistance to homeowners under the program. It offers housing rehabilitation assistance to low and moderate income Borough homeowners in the form of a "deferred payment" loan of up to \$25,000 for basic home improvements. The interest rate on these loans is 0%. The loans are not due to be repaid until the house is sold or title transferred. Funding for the program comes from COAH development fees that have been paid to the Borough since 2003.

Loans can be used for the repair or replacement of Roof & Gutters, Heating & Insulation, Plumbing, Windows & Doors, Kitchen, Bathrooms, Electrical System Upgrade, Porch and Step Repair.

The Tenafly Borough Housing Rehabilitation Program (THRP) can only help families whose income meets the following current State income guidelines for 2019:

Borough housing rehabilitation assistance to homeowners is in the form of a 0% interest, deferred payment loan that is repaid only when the home is sold or title transferred. The program's terms for Borough investor owners who provide rental housing to lower income families is set by the State and governs rent levels and tenant eligibility for 10 years.

To apply for the Tenafly Housing Rehabilitation Program you must obtain a pre-application form from either the Tenafly Public Library, the Tenafly Building Dept., 100 Riveredge Rd, or from the Borough's website home page, [under Online Municipal Forms](#).

- Applicants will be served on a first come, first served basis.

- Local home improvement contractors interested in submitting quotes on units to be rehabilitated through the program should also contact Mr. Weinberg.
